We are closing in on Easter.

Ok students, time for a review! Palm Sunday, Dominica in Palmis, begins the period we call Holy week. We will celebrate some distinctive events this day: First, the blessing of the palms and then the procession that represents the Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem a week before the Resurrection. This procession was documented in churches as early as the 4th century CE, so this parade hasn't been manufactured for modern entertainment.

Gather with us in the parlor on Holy Wednesday for worship. This day has traditionally been the day when the church's focus is on two biblical characters: The Woman who anointed Jesus, and Judas Iscariot. Also, it has traditionally been a day for the sacrament of unction. In our reformed tradition, it is about preparation for the holiest days of the church year and we will be using the preparatory service from the E&R Hymnal so that we might 'prepare.'

Then, Maundy Thursday, or the Thursday before Easter, will find us 'remembering' the institution of the Holy Communion. Did you ever wonder where the name for this Holy Thursday came from? Maundy is derived from the first antiphon of the ceremony of the washing of the feet, mandatum

novum. It is called this to reflect Jesus' mandate "do this in remembrance of me."


Then, Friday will find us worshiping here at 7:00 pm for Tenebrae. Good Friday is called by the Greek Orthodox "great Friday." In our tradition the word Good originates in our description of it being God's Friday. Tenebrae was originally held in the early hours of "Holy Saturday," but is celebrated in our church on Good Friday evening. This name literally means darkness, and originates in the tradition of extinguishing the lights in church, as we remember the falling away of disciples and finally the death of Jesus. We leave the sanctuary in silence and reflection, no recessional, even as we anticipate our joyous return Easter Morning.

This is the height of our year as Christians. I hope I've explained what some of this week means. But really meaning comes through experience. We 'make' meaning. This is not an intellectual enterprise. As we participate in these events we participate in these events 'for real.' The flowers, the palms, the cross, they are here to be 'meaningfull.' But without you, they are only signs of something to be received.

Holy week, in total, was a time when candidates for baptism put in the final preparations for this sacrament. It was a time of devotion, a time of learning.

For now, fellow disciples, this ends the review, class continues in practice.

A Special Congregational Meeting was held on March 10th, where the congregation unanimously voted to approve the Consistory's proposed bid to contract KCM Precision to apply a new (standing-seam) metal roof over the social hall. The trustees of the Consistory have consulted multiple contractors and continue to monitor our various roof matters in the order of their significance. As discussed during the November Congregational Meeting, the funding for each roof improvement will be sourced as follows: 50% from the Althouse Fund and 50% was raised internally through designated giving. To donate specifically towards a roof improvement – please label your contribution as "Church Roof Improvements".

Our fundraising and missions' committees, as a symbol of their commitment have devoted a lot of their time in organizing inspiring projects to bring our congregation together in unison. I encourage everyone to inquire about the upcoming events and opportunities to assist. Our involvement in missions' and fundraising activities will expand our ministries and encourage teamwork to shape our friendships in Christ.

Lots of people are homeless, for real. Their belongings (what a strange word) are all in one bag. They sleep outside. Some are urban pioneers and sleep on church steps or under highways. They don't like shelters. They are shelter makers. Some have communities and know the schedules for the local soup kitchens. They rise at dawn. They head south in the winter. They depend on what can only be called the right hand of God. Even more people are spiritually homeless. They/we have a bed and sheets. We wonder if we should declutter or if we have too many belongings. We wonder if we are taking proper care of the boiler or the gutters. We also rise at dawn and reach out for the right hand of the Almighty and wonder where it went. Congregations are soup kitchens for the spiritually hungry. They are shelters for the spiritually homeless. Respite lodging for the people who are in need of respite. Domiciles for the spirit. Nests for the baby bird in all of us, no matter how old we are. Nursing homes for those who can't bathe or tie their own shoes any more. Rehab centers for those who should have done prehab but forgot. Habitats for humanity.
