Lent is a time of year when many people turn their attention to Christian practices. It is popular to engage in a period of 'self-denial.' I know a certain young lady who gives up chocolate.

There isn't anything wrong with this kind of discipline. It is important to remember that the purpose of any Lenten discipline is to draw us closer to God. The Word of the Prophet Micah is ringing in my ears: "He has showed you, O man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8, NIV).

In the New Testament, Matthew's Jesus says, "But go and learn what this means: I desire mercy, not sacrifice..." (Matthew □13)

Christian practices are not only a means to greater knowledge, but greater faithfulness, lived out in our daily lives. Once, there were seven practices that were generally agreed upon: Fasting, the sacred meal (Eucharist), prayer (hours), keeping the Sabbath, the Liturgical Year, and the making of pilgrimage. These disciplines kept time in the Christian's life, they monitored or directed its movement.

Of these disciplines, tithing is the most difficult to discuss. Ironically, tithing and the sacred meal were the first of the seven disciplines given to Christians. Like the sacred meal, tithing was given early on, and was not a recent addition to 'get our money.'

Tithing, is not 'dues.' Like all of the other Christian disciplines, giving is a spiritual practice that we live out in a concrete way. It, like any Christian practice, intends to form our faith. In this letter, I do not have the space or the inclination to offer you a complete reflection on this matter. I hope it suffices to say that this practice of tithing is lived out by giving a regular, proportional, gift to God of our treasure. This goal is not achieved by a few weeks of a Lenten discipline. It is, rather, a background habit, a reminder that our lives and all our possessions are not our own. God no more needs our money than God needs our prayers to know what our needs are. Instead, God is at all times working in our world to redeem it, and to the extent we want to be part of that goal, God will use us. Like all Christian disciplines, tithing draws us closer to God and to one another.

I once had someone in a new member class ask the question straight away: "how much should we give?" In my shock I could only reply, "how much do you want to give?" I sincerely believe that the amount is not as important as your relationship to that amount; regular proportional giving is what is important.

Despite much handwringing during the fall over church finances, it is important to remember that 2018 books closed with our books in 'the black.' This happened through frugal expenditures and generous giving. Well done.

Still, the numbers are not the final word. Rather, Jesus' words here are: "give, and it will be given you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For the measure you give will be the measure you get back." (Luke 6:38). This applies to more than money for sure. God desires to bless us. God does bless us. Let us give thankful praise! 


