Easter is past, and many of us whose lives revolve around the life of the church can be heard heaving a sigh.

For those of you who did not make the whole journey from Bethany to Jerusalem, I want to let you know that it is safe to come out again. The stone is rolled away. "He is not here," the young man at the crypt proclaims. What the disciples find in the comfort of their homes was that it is not so much about what they are ready or not ready for, what they see or refuse to see, but that the risen Jesus is ready for them, ready to open their eyes to his life-giving presence.

In the weeks between Easter and Ascension Day, we will not have a prayer of confession in worship. Why? I dispense with this part of the liturgy to remind us that, like the first disciples, the risen Jesus is in our midst. And, if he is there among us we have no need for confession for surely he knows our hearts.

Perhaps these weeks can be a time when each of us can renew our relationship with this same risen Lord. Along the Emmaus road, two disciples pour out their hearts to a stranger. They tell him of their disillusionment, about how much they had hoped that Jesus was the one to bring in the promised reign of God. The stranger listens. Then the stranger is downright rude. He would not follow normal pastoral courtesies. He doesn't say, "I know you are hurting." He doesn't offer any condolences. He is blunt. He calls them fools. He wonders aloud if they have ever read their bible. He then rehearses all of God's salvation history from Abraham through the people's return from Exile to Jerusalem.

I like this story because it is not so much about our search for a risen Jesus. It is about his search for us. It is not so much about one radical new thing God does in the world, but a series of actions that demonstrate God's unending love for us. One prayer book captures this post Easter time with this prayer: "Lord Jesus, stay with us, for evening is at hand and the day is past; be our companion in the way, kindle our hearts and awaken hope, that we may know you as you are revealed in scripture and the breaking of the bread. Grant this for the sake of your love."

I know that Jesus can find you wherever you are. If a tomb cannot contain Jesus, neither can any church. But here, especially here, we will be giving attention to those things that help us get found.


REASONS TO VOLUNTEER AT YOUR LOCAL FOOD PANTRY


