We ask you – and everyone in our congregation -- to thoughtfully and prayerfully discern our priorities in life, and to direct more of our time and money to the efforts of Zion Blue Mountain to preach the Gospel and assist our community.

Let us honor the legacy given to us by generations of worshippers who have sustained our church for nearly three hundred years. Let us value the collaborative faith that unites us today and pledge to work hand in hand to strengthen Zion Blue Mountain for the future.

Together, with the help of God, we can do as a congregation what we can't do alone.



Mission Statement

In Mark's Gospel, chapter 12, verses 41-44, we read the story of Jesus observing the widow put two copper coins in the treasury. In this story from St. Mark, Jesus praises the poor widow's offering, and makes it clear that the standard measurement for assessing gifts is not how much we give to the work of God or how much we put in the offering plate, but how much we have left for ourselves. I am talking about proportional giving. Jesus said, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be require; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded." (Luke 12:48)



It is clear to see that the small gift of the poor widow is generous. When we think about the Gospel's description of Christian stewardship in the long term, everyone's giving of themselves to others is expected to be generous. Time, love, talent can be given generously; in this text it is about money. This is more than a symbolic gesture. It demonstrates a gratitude for God's generosity to us.

I am asking you to think about Stewardship, big picture stewardship. It is about our tending to all of the gifts God gives us. For us, stewardship is proportional. Stewardship is a percentage of our time, talent, and treasure. No one is expected to give up everything like the early disciples (in Acts 4:32-35). But like the early disciples it is not unreasonable to expect that God's generosity to us would stimulate a grateful response in us.

Maybe the impetus for this reminder is that we have had a particularly difficult few summer months. And this cash flow issue weighs heavily on my heart. But I hope that, more than anything, I can help you understand that giving of your treasure and your time is an essential element of being a disciple of Jesus. And for disciples, what you do with your resources is the purest proof of what you truly believe.

Think about this while you are filling out your offering envelope in the weeks and months ahead. Think about this when someone calls up and asks you to volunteer for us (or for another good cause). When you update your will, think about this. All that is ever expected is a reflection of just how much you are thankful for.

Kingdom on wheels



"If you love what you do, you're going to talk about it," says Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Carson Wentz. "I love Jesus ... so I'm going to talk about [him]. But I'm not going to force [Christianity] down your throat, either." That's why the pro athlete tries to show his faith by "how I live and what I'm about."

Wentz started the foundation AO1 (Audience of One) to make a tangible impact beyond the gridiron. With a local church, he sponsors Thy Kingdom Crumb, a food truck that offers free meals to people in the community. The motto painted on the mobile restaurant sums up the message Wentz wants to share with his neighbors: "It's on us ... 'cause he loves you!"

Almost one year ago to the day there was a heavy downpour during the Sunday Worship service. For those of you who remember, the Sanctuary roof was leaking near the piano and someone placed a receptacle on the floor to catch the water. The sound of one drop after another falling 20 feet into an empty container filled the room with the sound that let everyone know - the church roof needed repairs.

To recap -we had several companies come out and do some inspections and provide some suggestions. The initial quotes gave us all a bit of sticker shock and left us wondering how we would tackle the repairs and remain financially solvent at the same time. After several months of deliberation it was decided that we would put a new roof on the social hall. The slate roof was to be repaired by a roofing company. The concrete decking in the steeple and the flat roof over the old Sunday School / overflow area would be repaired by Jon Schaeffer and Brain Houpt and their crew of helpers (thank you everyone!)

The repairs have been made to the 3 roofs on the older portion of the building as described above. If you have driven by lately you probably noticed the new metal roof on the social hall. As of this writing we are waiting for a final inspection on the work.

You may also have noticed the red goal thermometers throughout the building indicating where we are and where we need

to be in order to pay the bill. Due to the generosity of many we have come a long way in meeting this goal. We still have a way to go in an effort to use as little of the Althouse fund as possible. Every donation helps, no matter how large or small. Consistory as a whole greatly thanks those that have made a donation to the roof project and encourages those that are thinking about donating to consider the greater good of keeping our building in repair. Just like your home or car, your church takes constant upkeep and sometimes it is costly. A reminder that the original quote for all four roof projects was almost \$100,000 - but in examining all of our options and taking on some of the work internally we were able to reduce the expense considerably.

A plaque will commemorate the generosity of who helped us in those the project. 
FOOD PANTRY ITEM OF THE MONTH: Canned Fruit
