From Bill Worley, PSEC Conference Minister: Gun violence in America

Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! From now on five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three; they will be divided: father against son and son against father, mother against daughter and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."Luke 12:51-53

This is one of those Sundays when the Gospel reading might lead you to turn to one of the other lectionary texts. I would encourage you otherwise.

The meaning of Jesus' words divided people from the moment he spoke them. Everything we do and say moves us either closer to, or further way, from the Christ light. The effect of the moving creates division — in ourselves, our families, communities and, of course, our politics. Some translations render Jesus bringing a "sword", so we know how clean the division is that separates the movement to and from his light.

We have evolved from people of the sword into people of the gun. I am not suggesting that Jesus "brought a gun" but it seems to me that our gun culture has rendered us so violently divided as to be unrecognizable as the nation that once thought itself to be a "city on the hill and a light to the nations".

In 1 □ 5, General Synod 20 passed the resolution: "Guns and Violence;" calling on UCC members to engage in reflection to better understand the roots of violence in our culture. This June, the 32nd General Synod "called upon the Congress of the United States to conduct formal hearings to discover systemic and proximate causes of civilian violence in America, and to receive testimony as to changes in American society that may be undertaken to alleviate the effects of violence on the American people." (A Call for Congressional Hearings on Violence in America).

I am a gun owner. Have been all my life. From hunting to target shooting to military service, guns have been part of my family for as long as anyone can remember. I carry the memories of my grandfather and his father in the firearms they passed to me. Along with them I carry the expectations and ethics for their careful use.

Americans have added to the firearms of our forefathers hand-held and shoulder fired weapons of mass destruction. But we have abandoned the ethic or the expectation for their careful use in a culture that is driven entirely by irrational fear and racial division. There is reasonableness to our relationship with guns that no longer exists to protect a right without commensurate responsibility. Our days grow more deadly and we move further away from the Christ light.

Some ministry colleagues are calling for an all-out ban on guns. Others advocate for common sense gun laws. I believe that anyone who wants to own a gun needs to be part of the militia (National Guard or Federal Armed Services) where thorough background checks accompany proper training and service to the community. The solution will need to be as radical as the problem (see for instance Jesus).

There is so much more to say about the gospel text, Americans' gun culture and our current political climate that will not fit here. My hope and prayer is that all of our congregations are creating opportunities for conversation and action which diminish division and move people toward the Light of which our world is in separate need.

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Simply put, if it wasn't for faithful supporters like the members of our congregation, we wouldn't exist. So thank you for supporting the ongoing roof repairs and supplying the funds that we needed to make the necessary repairs. We were able to fund ½ of the cost through your generous donations. Anyone who donated will be recognized on our plaque.

Dear Christian Friends.

"It's the most wonderful time of the year," croons Andy Williams. I am not talking about Christmas, I am talking about September. Kids are back to school. The days are getting shorter. Before we know it, the leaves will begin to display a glorious tapestry. September is a time of transition.

With the movement of the Spirit, prayer, and discernment, we may well be on the way to a pastoral transition. I am writing this note to you in the third week of August, and at this moment the Search Team is feeling pretty great about a couple of the candidates they are working with.

We have worked hard to prepare the Sexton's House for a new tenant. A community dinner was held with over 86 attending. Our blood drive was a success. We have met our financial goal for the roof project. And, thanks to a faithful and generous response, the hard work of the Deacons and Consistory, it seems like the 'normal' summer cash flow disaster has been avoided. We have gathered to worship in the midst of oppressive heat, thanks to the air conditioned parlor. The food pantry has distributed food to the less fortunate. There have been weddings and funerals. The Gentle Rain pre-school is gearing up for another year of activity.

Summer, as you can see, has not been entirely restful. But the church, the 'holy catholic church,' is always on the move.

The church calendar claims that we are still in 'common time,' although I am not sure any time in the life of the church can be categorized as 'common.' In a way there is nothing "ordinary" about "Ordinary Time". Ordinary Time is not about common, regular, mundane, or run of the mill things. Ordinary Time comes from the word "ordinal" as in "ordinal numbers". Remember your math: Cardinal numbers answer "how many?" "Ordinal Numbers" tell the rank, they answer "what position?" "Where is it and in what direction is the progress?" Ordinal Numbers. During this time between Pentecost and the beginning of Advent, we read, in a continuous fashion the life and work of Jesus Christ as proclaimed in the Gospels. Our own common time, like summer, is not so different. Our 'normal' lives are not so normal where the good news of the Gospel is revealed, and our journey marked. In our ordinary time, like the liturgical calendar, it is good to notice where we are at and where we are going. In the company of the grace of God, it makes transitions like this hopeful.
