WHY ARE THE OCEANS BLUE? While I was completing my undergraduate degree at James Madison University many years ago, I took a course in Oceanography. I was fascinated then, and continue to be fascinated with the ocean and all of its life. When our children were at home and much younger, we vacationed at Emerald Isle, North Carolina. When we would go to our ocean hide-a-way, I was always quite willing to share with them the bank of knowledge I had retained about our oceans. I always remind my family why there are waves on the ocean and what creates them; why there is a high and a low tide; where all the sand came from; why there is salt in the ocean, and so on. After the first day, they usually would have enough of my "ocean wisdom," and they would tell me to keep my "wisdom" to myself.

Not to neglect my Zion Blue Mountain family, have you ever wondered why ocean water looks so blue? Perhaps you have not because the ocean waters along the coast are not blue. They range from a light green to brown. However, if you get far enough off shore, the waters of the ocean are a beautiful deep blue. Why the change?

The reason the ocean appears to be blue is because the surface of the water acts as a huge mirror and reflects the light. The color of light that it reflects most brilliantly is blue light. When the water is undisturbed and unpolluted, the color that you see is blue, hence the ocean water appears to be blue. The reason ocean water along the coast is not blue is because of the turbulence. The water flowing in from the main land carries everything from dirt to toxic chemicals. The waves crashing against the seashore keep the sand and silt agitated. Because of the turbulence and the presence of dirt and filth, the blue light is distorted causing the water to appear green or light brown. Not until you get far enough away from the turbulence do the particles filter out allowing the blue light to be reflected in its purist form.

Our lives are, in a way, very much like the ocean. We are reflectors of light, the light of Jesus Christ. In our purist form, we reflect the very essence of who Christ is. In our purist state we reflect the "blueness" of the life of Jesus. The problem is, often there is so much turbulence within us that our lives become muddled and the light we reflect becomes distorted to shades of green and brown. We need to take a lesson from our oceans. There are times when we need to get far enough away from shore to let the turbulence settle out of our lives. We need to take time to be still and hear the voice of God among the noise that pollutes our beings.

This is one of the things that can happen on a "vacation." We vacate the shores of our daily routine, getting far enough away to let things settle out. My prayer for you and your family is that you will have time this summer to allow the turbulence in your lives to settle a bit.

However, we do not have to go hundreds of miles away to enjoy these settling times. It can happen early in the morning as you sip your first cup of coffee. It can happen late at night when all are in bed and the house is quite again.

Where ever your peaceful place is, take advantage of these settling times. Know that God's presence is only a prayer and a whisper away. And above all enjoy your summer! God's Blessings ~Pastor Pat



Once these are all addressed the parking lot project can move forward. They discussed a capital campaign to fund these projects along with the parking lot. All the needed repairs would be included in this operation.

With less food donated by the congregation and the public, our pantry will have to continue to **buy** food and battle inflation alongside of everyone else.


We are providing a monthly suggestion in the newsletter and haven't been receiving many of those donations. As well as we haven't received one of our largest monetary donations from a local group.
